Jeff and Trudi Nelson MHS Forensics Fund Endowment

Earlier this year, the Foundation announced the endowment of the Jeff and Trudi Nelson Madison High School Forensics Fund. This fund will provide support to preserve and enhance the Madison High School Forensics programs which include Debate and Oral Interpretation. Jeff Nelson approached the Foundation with the idea of establishing a fund that would honor his wife, Trudi Nelson's service to the Madison Central School District. Trudi taught Language Arts for 15 years at the Madison Middle School (1988-2003) and several years at Madison High School, teaching Speech and English classes. For nine years during this period she was also the head coach of High School Debate and Oral Interpretation. Through her leadership, the De-

bate and Oral Interpretation programs were restored and reinvigorated. Jeff said Trudi was highly respected by coaches on the 'debate circuit' and was a relentless champion of student recruitment and performance. He said, "As an example of her quality guidance as a coach and mentor, several of her debate students excelled after leaving Madison. These included a future Rhodes Scholar and students who earned law degrees from Harvard and Duke Universities."

Trudi Nelson said, "It was a natural fit for us to want to enhance the Forensics programs at Madison High School. Hosting the Karl Mundt Debate Tournament was a key event in the South Dakota Forensics competition when I coached. Our Madison Forensics teams qualified several teams and

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individual competitors for National Forensics competition, as well as either winning or placing in the top tier of all South Dakota schools, including the state's largest schools."

Upon hearing the news of this new endowment, former MHS Activities Director, Mike Anderson commented: "Madison High School has a well-respected and successful Debate/ Oral Interp program. Trudi Nelson played a significant role in forming that reputation. During Trudi's tenure as the leader of those programs, MHS enjoyed tremendous success and respect state wide. The forming of this endowment is a fitting honor to her perseverance and dedication to MHS." Former Superintendent, Dr. John Sweet added: "During my 13 years at Madison, I very much appreciated the work of Trudi Nelson and the outstanding forensics program she led. This perspective comes not only from being the school superintendent, but as a parent of a student (Kim) that gained immensely from the program. I had first hand evidence of the importance and benefit of the debate and oral interpretation program. Debate students gathered frequently at our house. I was impressed with the depth of their conversations about policy issues and academics. Trudi inspired a level of conversation among students that I hadn't seen before or since. Those conversations continue today, almost twenty years later."

Glynnis Kunkel, Madison's debate coach, said, "I am so incredibly grateful for any opportunity that helps me coach my students. The students put so much time and effort into the program, as the Nelsons are so well-aware. With this

fund, we can purchase professional tools, such as brief cases and binders, and give the students a chance to compete further and in more events. I look forward to seeing how these changes will impact my growing team, and I am nothing but thankful to Jeff and Trudi Nelson, for their generous impact on the Forensic teams at Madison."

Matt Groce, Madison's Oral Interpretation coach added, "I am a former debate and Oral Interp student of Trudi's, who actively uses the skills I learned in those activities in my daily life. And in that, I am hardly alone. This gift will help us to expand the resources we offer to some of the best and brightest students in our community. I have a lot of conversations with students about what we can do to grow as actors and as public speakers. We have already begun looking at how we might be able to lower the cost of summer Oral Interp camps and expand our script catalog."

Foundation President, Jennifer Gross said, "We are very excited to accept this gift. The dividends from this gift will make a large impact on these important programs at Madison High School. Tom Bloom added, "This scholarship seemed like a fitting way to honor Jim's career and his affiliation with Madison High School as a member of the Class of 1956. Jim was a parent and grandparent of Madison alumni, and a mentor and friend to many."

Good News from the Director!

The Foundation awarded \$720 in need-based scholarships to students taking dual credit courses during the 2015-16 school year. Approximately 85 MHS juniors and seniors registered for a total of 260 dual credit courses during the school year. These courses count for both high school and college credit and they help students get through their college coursework not only faster, but at a special rate of \$40 per credit hour, or \$120 for a three-credit course. This low rate benefits all students. In addition, students with financial need can apply to the Foundation for a \$60 Dual-Credit Scholarship for each course they pass. Awarded students tell us they are grateful for the assistance provided by the Foundation.

Tom Hicks '78 Memorial Fund

Last spring, when members of the Madison High School Class of 1978 heard about the suicide of their friend and classmate, Tom Hicks, they started a memorial fund with the Madison Central School Educational Foundation as a way to do something meaningful to honor his life. Tom had been battling depression for a number of years and took his life on April 21, 2015. "Our friends hoped that something positive could come from this tragic event. We wanted to honor Tom's life and we knew that the Foundation would use the money in a positive way to impact Madison High School," said classmate Lori Mildenberg Waldner. Paul DeWaard, another classmate, suggested using the memorial fund to bring in a speaker on depression. He said, "If the program can inform students on how to recognize depression and how to get help, at least something good will have resulted from the tragic loss of our dear friend. I know Tom would want a program for students to learn about depression. He was a quiet and caring person who always wanted to help others," DeWaard added.

When Tom's family was notified about the memorial fund and of his friends' intention for its use, Tom's son, Justin replied, "I think this is a good use of this (memorial) fund. My dad's classmates can take some comfort knowing that this program will help students understand depression and suicide are real problems." Justin is vice president of the Yellow Ribbon Suicide Prevention Program in Mankato, Minnesota. "As a member of Yellow Ribbon, one of our biggest goals is to teach the signs and also let students know it is ok to ask for help. I think this assembly will help the students of Madison High School recognize the signs in themselves, in a friend or family member, and know how to ask for help," he said.

The assembly was held at Madison High School on April 15th. Guidance Counselor, Stephanie Moore, invited Nolan Hunt from the 211 Helpline Center in Sioux Falls to speak. Lori Mildenberg Waldner told the students about Tom Hicks and the memorial fund's purpose before introducing the speaker. "This was a wonderful illustration of how friends in this high school stay connected

through the years and how they take care of each other," said Foundation Director, Beth Knuths. Hunt presented some of the new resources available to students through the 211 Helpline Center, and the Text4Help service.

The Tom Hicks Memorial Fund will be used for the purpose of heightening student awareness of depression and suicide prevention.

The Foundation encourages and rewards innovation in the classroom and provides educational and enrichment opportunities for students and staff beyond what is provided for within the school budget. The 2016 Norm Johnson Educator Grant awards were announced in early May. Every year, more money is budgeted for these grants and every year, we work hard to find additional funds so we can fund more educator requests—our teachers keep us growing! Norm Johnson '58, was an educator in the Madison Central District for 31 years. Johnson's memorial fund was endowed in 2012. These mini-grants are funded by this endowment and from money raised at the Foundation's annual Philanthropy Dinner.
